One of our great successes of recent years, thanks to Kristin Kinney and Brian Farrant, is the **DOC concession**. It is only available to members of ProGuides NZ to join as an individual. It cannot be used by owner/operators of Small Tour Operators, unless you contract yourself as a tour guide - a small technicality but it makes the difference on whether or not you can apply.

It allows guiding and accompanying clients to a list of conforming tracks, as well as parking in dedicated areas. If you want to propose additional tracks to be added to the ProGuides concession list, please send a note to doc@proguides.co.nz as soon as possible. We are currently in discussion with DOC staff about the mechanism for achieving this. However, they must be tracks which are on DOC's conforming tracks list.

Track Updates

Northlanders are relieved that SH 1 over <u>Brynderwyn</u> <u>Hills have re-opened</u> at the end of June following a four-month closure that's cost the region's economy hundreds of millions of dollars.

A short-term fix to reinstate walking access to Cathedral Cove on the Coromandel Peninsula will be ready in time for summer. The conservation ministry will spend NZ\$ 5 million to plan, build and maintain the track.

There is also some good news from the East Coast: After 11 years taking <u>exclusive tours of The Farm and</u> <u>coastline at Cape Kidnappers</u>, Fox and Amy Nilsson are now offering the opportunity to the public in partnership with Rosewood Cape Kidnappers Lodge.
