What to Watch



DOC Matters

As stated in our previous newsletter, the Department of Conservation (DOC) has opened public consultation on how it manages its land. Submissions are due by **28 February 2025.** The Association supports the concept of charging for access to defined areas of conservation land, but has several strong recommendations, amongst them that the charging mechanism must be simple, and there should be clear evidence how the revenue has been applied. **Check out Helen's paper here.** However, your opinion on the topics are important, too. Where does the IVL go

The International Visitor Levy (IVL) increase to \$100 is set to inject an estimated \$229 million annually into tourism and conservation. However, questions are being raised where the additional funding is going. Here are two examples:

Backcountry huts in the South Island

Twenty backcountry huts and some tracks on the South Island will be maintained and improved with \$4.2 million levied on international tourists at the border. The money will largely be spent on building

supplies, while the labour - even highly skilled labour - is done by volunteers, coordinated by the Backcountry Trust. Click here for more information.

Transit Gondola in Queenstown

Planning's well advanced for two critical Queenstown infrastructure projects — a Southern Lakes base hospital and a \$200million gondola link between the airport in Frankton and the CBD. Both projects will be funded by private interest. But there'd also be hoped-for support from the IVL. Read more here.

Recovery still in process

The return of international visitors is still not at levels from before the pandemic. According to Stats NZ, in November 2024 the country was at a 86% recovery compared to the arrivals 2019. A development that concerns TEC CEO Lynda Keene. Read more about it here.

Meaningful Research

Moana Mark continues to demonstrate how tourism can drive meaningful conservation and scientific research. Partnerships with operators like Whale Watch and Pohatu Penguins are funding critical studies, including sperm whale abundance in Kaikōura, which revealed a record-low of just five individuals last winter.

Tuatapere Hump Ridge Track

The country's newest Great Walk has already achieved international status in its first summer. The Hump Ridge Track is now officially open as a Great Walk. The three-day loop traverses subalpine tops, winding around rugged coastline and over historic viaducts in southern Fiordland.
