Government strengthens Tourism

In a bid to strengthen local economy and rebuild tourism infrastructure, the government has allocated NZ\$ 1.6 million to repair and reopen the **Great Taste Cycle Trail in the Tasman region,** which was badly damaged by recent weather events. It has also launched a **targeted marketing campaign** to promote domestic tourism in the region.

Visitors up

International visitor arrivals to New Zealand increased by 5% in the year ending June 2025, reaching **3.38 million visitors**. The rise in arrivals contributed to a 4.3% increase in the economic value of international tourism, totaling NZ\$ 12.1 billion for the same period.

Return of the Ferries

After a three-year hiatus the Auckland to Coromandel ferry service is set to return this summer, launching on October 24, just in time for Labour weekend. Explore Group has announced that it will operate an express service Friday evening as well as Saturday and Sunday departures with plans to increase the schedule. Over in Roturua, the Lakeland Queen is back. Its new owner, Damon Hagaman, is happy to have the iconic boat back on the lake.

Albatros Centre Dunedin



Members, Associates and Mentors





A very warm welcome to all our new members (see below). We also welcome associate members and are looking for mentors who would like to support the newbies.
